## Ben Praises Indiana for Defense

"Sure, we had a lot of chances and we managed to cash in on only one of them," said Syracuse coach Ben Schwartzwelder yesterday. "But we won, and anytime we win it's good enough for me."

While fans were still discussing the 7-0 SW decision over Indiana in Bloomington, Ind. Saturday, an early check on injuries indicated that the Orangemen didn't appear to have suffered any serious effects from the ruggedly played game. Today, however, some of the hurt players are found to be more painful.

"Fans don't give enough credit to the Indiana defense," said Ben. "If only their defense was as tough as Northwest's, it not tougher."

Despite the overpowering heat and humidity, Ben thought that "we held up well in spite of the weather, although both teams had to substitute freely to try to keep some semblance of fresh players in there."

"Any time you play a Big Ten team, it's a challenge," Schwartzwelder added. "And we went well on offense, and we were against a well-coached team. Syracuse got the ball on nine "turnovers," on five interceptions, a blocked punt and three fumbles, but could turn only one turnover into a score.

Talking about Tommy Myers' game-saving end-zone interception late in the fourth period, Ben marveled: "What an outfielder! No baseball player with a big glove on could have done a better job!"

Though he still hadn't seen the film, Ben thought sophomore Brian Hambleton deserved two passes, as did Myers, and Ken also picked off a mid-air fumble after an Indiana pass completion.

Part of the trouble on offense in the second half was the players' difficulty in adjusting to different defenses after getting used to the cadence and snap used by Woodruff. The other King, Dave A. King, seemed to do well as a linebacker, and the shift of Len Maszi to defensive end seemed to do well. Ted Lawowicz was credited with being the top tackler for Syracuse, with eight solo tackles and two assists.

Among other things, there'll be a lot of work on the kicking game this week. Without Eric Baugher, left behind because of a leg injury, the Orangemen had no experienced field goal kicker, and had to pass up some chances for three-pointers. George Bodine hadn't kicked punts regularly since his high school days, and Scott Robinson, primary punter, had to do the kicking off — which he did quite well.

## Chiefs Whip Denver, 16-3

DENVER (UPI) — Kansas City defensive end Aaron Brown grabbed the ball in the air after Denver quarterback Don Horn was hit attempting to pass Sunday and ran 88 yards to lead the Chiefs to the best offense in the contest — four times Horn was intercepted and three times the Chiefs cashed in the opportunity.

Ken Stensrud kicked field goals of 20, 26 and 16 yards and missed from 54 and 26 yards. Denver's Jim Turner kicked a 37-yard field goal with 2:14 gone in the first period for Denver's only score.

The play was set up when Kansas City quarterback Len Dawson fumbled the first offensive snap of the game.

Brown's touchdown was particularly crushing because it cut off a promising drive at the Kansas City 24 yard line when Dave Washington recovered a Wendell Hayes fumble. Kansas City linebacker Bobby Bell blind sided Horn, hitting his arm as he started to pass, with just 12 seconds gone in the second quarter. Brown, charging into the backfield after Horn, grabbed the ball with no one between him and the goal line. Kansas City picked up 11 first downs to nine for Denver but had only 159 yards total offense to 220 for the Broncos.

Denver did not make a first down on the ground. Kansas City lost two fumbles to one for the Broncos and Dawson had only one pass intercepted by Horn's four.

Dawson, a favorite target of the Denver defense who got hit 12 times last year, was dropped twice for 25 yards.

Just one Super Bowl champion came to Denver as the defending Denver Bowls champion and were stunned 26-13 by the Broncos. Sunday's game at least partially made up for that.

Denver lost to Green Bay last week when Horn was intercepted six times and tied Miami the week before. The Chiefs are 2-1.

Stensrud's 35-yard kick came after Johnny Robinson intercepted Horn and Denver's Clem Turner drew a 15-yard penalty for piling on. The 16-yard field goal was set up when Jim Kearney intercepted Horn at the Denver 35 and returned to the 17.
